Letter to Dr. David Blumenthal, Commonwealth Fund, about the National Vital Signs paper from IOM

Dr. Blumenthal, you will not remember but we met when you were at the ONC. We discussed the potential for Meaningful Use becoming an obstacle to EMR adoption. It appears that that has not happened. My practice, Southeast Texas Medical Associates, LLP has kept pace with all of CMS and ONC's requirements and we have used EMR and electronic patient management since 1998.
